# Cost of Living Dashboard



#### Introduction

A local data and intelligence dashboard has been created to provide an evidence base for Sheffield's cost-of-living response. It is made up of three main sections:

**Context** - a combination of national and local data that illustrates some of the factors that have created the conditions for the crisis

**Impacts** - looks at areas that would be expected to be affected by the crisis, including homelessness, food poverty, SCC Rent Arrears and crime

**Types of Support** - considers the demand for support from the council and its partners, including data from Sheffield Citizens Advice and Household Support Fund

The dashboard has Sheffield-specific data where possible, with national datasets used where local data is not available.

### COST OF LIVING CONTEXT

#### COST OF LIVING CONTEXT

This section shows the overall issues the city is facing in terms of the cost-of-living crisis.

**Prices and Wages -** provides an overview of annual Consumer Price Index inflation rate changes, with additional detail on the cost of food. There is also a comparison of the wage growth alongside an index of inflation to illustrate the extent to which wages are keeping pace with rising prices.


**Energy Costs -** highlights the price increases experienced over time, the price cap changes and the impact of the Government's price cap intervention.


Housing Costs - gives a top-level view of housing costs for mortgage and rental rates over time.


**Housing Conditions -** focuses on Private Sector Housing. The data here comes from a survey carried out every five years and gives us an overall snapshot of fuel poverty and property disrepair across the city.


**Benefit Claimants** - provides context around some of the benefits information in the city to give a picture of the number of people accessing the welfare system. Included in this is Universal Credit (UC) and Pension Credit data. Note that benefit claimant data comes with significant caveats. For example:


- the increase in UC claimants will reflect both people newly entering the welfare system as well as people on legacy benefits (not shown on these charts) moving to UC.
- Pension Credit is useful for reflecting the level of financial need amongst older people in Sheffield, however it is likely that there are significant numbers of people who are eligible that do not claim what they are entitled to, due to a lack of awareness or perhaps the stigma associated with receiving welfare support.











#### IMPACTS

#### **IMPACTS**

This section is designed to give a picture of the likely impacts of the cost of living crisis within the city. Each tab looks at a different area of concern:

**Homelessness** - becoming homeless is a real risk of the cost-of-living crisis, especially for the most vulnerable in society. These metrics have been included to give a full understanding of the situation in our city. Here we look at the number of people presenting as homeless, including by household composition and by ethnicity. It should be noted that changes in homelessness can be impacted by a number of factors, not just this crisis.


**Food Poverty** - The cost of food is increasingly a stressor for residents during this crisis. The data within this area gives an overall picture of food insecurity using both national survey data and some limited data from local food banks. The city's food banks measure their parcels/clients differently, for this reason we have included Trussell Trust food banks as a larger source of consistent data. Broadly, this comprises over half the food banks open in the city but is not exclusive with many independent food banks providing a valuable service to residents in crisis.


**SCC Rent Arrears** – here we have detailed, up-to-date data looking at the latest information relating to Council Housing tenants who are in arrears on their rent. It should be noted that it only covers one type of tenure in the city. Rent arrears is likely to be similar for other social-rented tenants but much higher for private-rented tenants, whose rents are higher and whose landlords do not have the same levels of support that the Council can provide to its tenants.


**Community & Crime** - As the Cost-of-Living increases, there are concerns that this could also lead to an increase in levels of crime, particular acquisitive crime and domestic abuse. To highlight this, we have included relevant metrics, however, although crime statistics can reflect real trends, these are heavily dependent on attitudes and practices relating to reporting and recording particular offences.


Housing Evictions - An overview of eviction and possession data for mortgages, private landlords and council housing.


**Businesses** - As a city, Sheffield has a high proportion of small and medium-sized businesses, and increased costs are having an impact here too. The data looks at the number of new businesses opening against business closures.














#### TYPES OF SUPPORT

#### TYPES OF SUPPORT


This section of the dashboard aims to give an understanding of the hardship and other forms of assistance available in the city for people in financial difficulty. It should be noted that this often cannot fully reflect the need for support as demand often outstrips supply, however, we can note some patterns that could help us understand the situation for different residents and to focus support most effectively.


**General Cost of Living** section has a series of the tabs that show the levels of interaction with websites and the SCC Community Support Helpline, as well as attempting to capture the use of 'Welcome Places' - a diverse network of organisations with different types of offers to suit their communities. We have included some information from SCC libraries as a proxy, however it can be difficult to unpick both trends after the pandemic and the differing uses of libraries. Locations for other types of Welcome Place's have been included via VAS data map link.


**Citizens Advice Data** section has locally available data from Citizens Advice Sheffield. Here it highlights the top issues people are seeking help with, and how this is playing out across the city. National Citizens Advice also have a useful data dashboard showing Cost of Living trends, much of which is reflected in Sheffield. Their dashboard can be found **here** 

**Council Hardship Schemes** section provides information about financial support available from SCC, with a focus on the Household Support Fund, a DWP-funded scheme that provides support for essentials. Other types of support data included come from:

- Local Assistance Scheme crisis grants;
- Government-funded Energy Grants, administered by SCC;
- Council Tax Hardship Scheme and Discretionary Housing Payments, which help people with housing costs.




